Item No. : 4

It has been observed that the Company has not been able to fill up the vacancies of Panel Chairman for Medical Items of Plastics since the Constitution of the said panel. Also it is observed that there needs to re-constitute panels for the same items included in the miscellaneous products and items (n.e.s.). It may be informed that due to the instructions from the Ministry to keep the elections for the Committee of administration on hold and that the process of re-constitution of the panel is underway this item can be considered once any directive from the Government is received on the elections process.

## 1. REVIEW OF EXPORT PERFORMANCE

The export analysis shown in Table 1 indicates that growth in 2022-23 was negative at 10.42% implying exports of 11.96 billion US Dollars. Plastic raw materials – the largest category – constituted 27.77% of total Plexconcil product exports and recorded a negative growth of 21.52% in 2022-23. Export of value-added plastics registered a negative growth of 4.71%. Value-added items formed 66.51% of total Plexconcil product exports in 2022-23.

The direction of Plexconcil product export, as shown in Table 2(a) and 2(b), indicates that exports during 2022-23 showed a negative growth especially to destination countries like Turkiye, Italy, Nepal, China, and Bangladesh among others. Few destination countries like Saudi Arabia and Poland reported a positive growth. Region-wise, Europe was the most important region, followed by NAFTA and WANA.

## 2. PARTICIPATION AT INTERNATIONAL/ DOMESTIC TRADE FAIRS & EXHIBITIONS

### International Shows

#### 2.1 India Pavilion at International Exhibition JEC WORLD 2022, France - 03.05.2022 to 05.05.2022

PLEXCONCIL organized India Pavilion for the first time at the JEC WORLD 2022 from 3rd May- 5th May at Paris, France with 8 exhibitors. The Exhibition featured a wide-ranging product categories from Packaging, Building & Construction, Automotive, Electrical & Electronic, and Household & Agriculture, among others.

During his visit to the Indian Pavilion, Mr. Deepanshu Khurana, Economic and Commercial Manager and Second Secretary (E&C) at the Embassy of India in Paris, had fruitful discussions with PLEXCONCIL about promoting exports of Composite & FRP products from India. He engaged with each exhibitor and offered support for a successful delegation visit to JEC 2023 to enhance exports to France. JEC World 2022 worked as an effective relationship-marketing tool which had connected with the global composite industry. Mrs. Bharti Parave – Asst. Director represented the Council during the exhibition.



Eight Indian Exhibitors participated in this exhibition were: Essen International, Kinenco Limited, Kinenco Kaman Composite India Pvt. Ltd, Mechenco Industries, Mechenco Resin Pvt. Ltd, Network Polymers Pvt. Ltd, Royal Thermoset Pvt. Ltd & Twins Engineers Pvt. Ltd.

Exhibitors interacted with prospective buyers, distributors, agents and other relevant business associates. The council received positive feedback from exhibitors about visitor engagement and event organization despite post-pandemic challenges. The Second Secretary assured support for a successful delegation visit to JEC 2023 to enhance exports to France.

#### 2.2 India Pavilion at Expo Plast Peru 2022 - 24.08.2022 to 27.08.2022

PLEXCONCIL organized the INDIA PAVILION at Expo Plast Peru 2022 which was supported by Embassy of India, Lima. The exhibition was held in Villa Ciudad Ferial, Lima, Peru from August 24th to 27th, 2022.

Expo Plast Peru 2022 is the gateway to the plastics Industry and related sector in Peru. Expo Plast Peru 2022 is the Largest Exhibition in Peru for Plastics Industry and is the gateway for the MSME to explore business opportunities for the local plastics Industry and related sector in Peru and other neighbouring countries.





India Pavilion during this Exhibition was inaugurated by H. E. Shri M Subbarayudu, Ambassador of India, Peru and Bolivia. President of APIPLAST (Peruvian Association of the Plastic Industry) also joined the inaugural ceremony. During the Inauguration ceremony, the Ambassador of India deliberated with participants on boosting exports from India to Peru and assured of support as and when required by Indian Plastic Industry.

During 4 days at the fair, Exhibitors interacted with prospective buyers, distributors, agents and other relevant business associates. Several meetings were also held of Embassy of India and PLEXCONCIL with Chamber of Commerce and important associations regarding boosting bilateral trade and fulfilling Peruvian requirement of Machinery, Raw Material, semi-finished, finished Plastic products through Indian suppliers.



## 2.3 K Show, Dusseldorf, Germany – 19.10.2022 to 26.10.2022

The K Show was held in Dusseldorf, Germany from 19<sup>th</sup> to 26<sup>th</sup> October 2022. As per fair authority, K Show is the world's no 1 trade fair for Plastics & Rubber. During the show, the Council's representative met various participating trade associations and fair authorities for promotion of trade. PLEXCONCIL jointly with PLASTINDIA Foundation organized India Pavilion at this show.

The India Pavilion was inaugurated by Shri. Amit Telang, Consul General, Consulate General of India in Frankfurt; Shri. Hemant Minocha, Chairman, PLEXCONCIL; Shri. Jigish Doshi, President, Plastindia Foundation; Mr. Ravish Kamath, Vice President, Plastindia Foundation; Shri. Sribash Dasmohapatra, Executive Director, PLEXCONCIL; Mr. Ajay Shah, NEC Chairman, Plastindia; Shri. Jayesh Rambhia, Treasurer, Plastindia Foundation; Shri. Arvind Mehta, Chairman and Managing Director, Welset Plast Extrusions Pvt Ltd in the presence of Shri. Thomas Schlitt, Managing Director, Messe Dusseldorf India; Shri. #### 2.4 11<sup>th</sup> PLASTIC JAPAN 2022, MAKUHARI MESSE, Tokyo, Japan – 07.12.2022 to 09.12.2022

The PLEXCONCIL in its endeavour to promote the export of plastics products took part in 11<sup>th</sup> PLASTICS JAPAN 2022 Show, Tokyo, Japan for the first time with 6 exhibitors.

PLASTIC JAPAN 2022 is the World's Leading Show for Advanced Plastics & Equipment, specializing in Plastic, CFRP, Cellulose Nano Fiber and Bio Plastic. The show gathers all kinds of plastics/composite materials as well as its manufacturing and processing technologies. More than 50,000 high quality visitors and 850 renowned exhibitors from across the global were part of this show.

The Indian pavilion had 6 Exhibitors displaying products like masterbatches, packaging, value added products. The exhibition provided a great platform for the first-time exhibitors at the show to create awareness about the Indian Products in Japan. The Indian Pavilion made a footprint at the show even though this was the first time the PLEXCONCIL had organized the Pavilion in Japan.

Shri. Shishir Kothari, First Secretary (Commerce), the Embassy of India, Tokyo, Japan visited the India Pavilion to interact with the exhibitors and to understand the overview of the Plastic Industry in India.

The main points discussed were:

1. Mounting a buyers delegation to visit PLEXCONNECT 2023 to India held from June15-17, 2023 at Mumbai, India
2. To recommend any other plastic related show in Japan
3. To get more information about the FIBC buyers in Japan as FIBC has huge potential for India companies to cater to the Japanese market.

4. To share the data and other important events pertaining to the Plastic Industry
5. Proposal to host a standalone Plastics Exhibition/BSM in Tokyo during 2023 instead of participating in bigger shows to get more mileage for Indian companies.

#### 2.5 AMBIENTE 2023 Show, Germany – 03.02.2023 to 07.02.2023

The PLEXCONCIL in its endeavour to promote the export of plastics products took part in AMBIENTE 2023, a show dedicated to the houseware and consumer ware being held after a gap of 3 years at the Messe Frankfurt, Germany with 11 exhibitors.

The Indian pavilion had 10 Exhibitors displaying products which included consumer and houseware appealing to the European and Middle East markets. The exhibition provided a great platform for first-time exhibitors at the show to create awareness about Indian Products in Europe. The Indian Pavilion made a footprint at the show even though this was the first time the PLEXCONCIL had organized the Pavilion.



India Pavilion was housed in Hall 11.1 which was categorized for Global Sourcing along with other international pavilions that were displaying in products of the same segment.

The inputs received from the exhibitors had mixed views. Some of them did real business through the buyers were from mostly Middle Eastern countries rather than Europe.



An infographic was posted on the Embassy of India, Berlin, Germany social media handles to promote the Pavilion amongst German buyers along with posting on all the PLEXCONCIL social media avenues.

#### PLEXCONNECT 2023 Promotions

The PLEXCONNECT 2023 was promoted effectively during the show by the Council's representative visiting potential exhibitors/buyers and inviting them to visit the show. The Council representative made a presentation during the Interactive Meeting hosted by the Consulate General, Frankfurt office on 3<sup>rd</sup> Feb 2023 at Hotel Kempinski highlighting the salient features and requesting the Embassy to support in bringing buyers from Germany to visit India.

#### 2.6 15th IPF BANGLADESH 2023 SHOW, Dhaka, Bangladesh – 22.02.2023 to 25.02.2023

The PLEXCONCIL in its endeavour to promote the export of plastics products took part in the 15<sup>th</sup> IPF Bangladesh 2023 Show, Dhaka, Bangladesh with 10 exhibitors.

IPF, being one of the established tradefairs in Bangladesh's plastics, printing and packaging industry, provided powerful extensive business contacts and promoted technical exchange among the parties associated with the entire industrial chains. This show gathered 542 world-class manufacturers from 21 countries and regions and occupied 742 booths to showcase top-end technologies, including injection moulding machines, extrusion lines, blown moulding machines, circular loom, etc.,



The PLEXCONCIL's Indian pavilion had 10 Exhibitors displaying products like Masterbatches, packaging, value added products and Machineries related to Extrusion & Injection Moulding. The exhibition provided a great platform for the exhibitors at the show to gain more market access for the Indian Products/Machineries in Bangladesh.

The inputs received from the exhibitors had mixed views. They felt that the show was more focussed on Machineries compared to the value-added plastic products. However, they felt that entering into the Bangladesh market is quite important considering the India's bilateral trade with the neighbouring country and also the vast opportunities to be explored and to substitute the Chinese market presence. Some promising inquiries were received.



Shri. Pratik D. Negi, First Secretary (Eco&Commerce), the High Commission of India, Dhaka, Bangladesh visited the India Pavilion to interact with the exhibitors and to understand the overview of the Plastic Industry in India.

PLEXCONNECT 2023 was also promoted during the event.



## 2.7 India Pavilion at KOPLAS 2023 (27th Korea International Plastics & Rubber Show), South Korea - 14.03.2023 to 18.03.2023

PLEXCONCIL organized India Pavilion for the first time at KOPLAS 2023, 27<sup>th</sup> Korea International Plastics & Rubber Show from 14<sup>th</sup> March-18<sup>th</sup> March at Goyang, South Korea. Korea's No.1 Plastics and Rubber Industry Exhibition featured wide ranging products from raw materials of plastic to moulds, processing machines, ancillary equipment, automation solutions, printing, packaging, semi-finished goods, finished goods from plastics and rubber industry.

India Pavilion at KOPLAS 2023 was inaugurated on 14<sup>th</sup> March 2023 by Shri. Swapnil Devidas Thorat, Second Secretary (Commerce & Investment), Embassy of India Seoul, Republic of Korea. During the Inauguration ceremony Shri. Swapnil Devidas Thorat deliberated with Indian exhibitors on boosting exports from India to South Korea and assured support as and when required by Indian Plastic Industry.



Four Indian Exhibitors participated in this exhibition were: Kanpur Plastipack Limited, Jumbo Bag Limited, Manali Pigments Private Ltd. and Dali Electronics. During 5 days at the fair, Exhibitors interacted with prospective buyers, distributors, agents and other relevant business associates.

Several meetings were also held between PLEXCONCIL and Chamber of Commerce, agents, trade distributors and Plastic importers regarding boosting bilateral trade and fulfilling requirement of Korean companies of Raw Material, semi-finished, finished Plastic products and Machinery through Indian exporters.

## 2.8 India Evening at Embassy of India, Seoul, South Korea - 14.03.2023

PLEXCONCIL and Embassy of India, Seoul, Republic of Korea in association with Indian Chamber of Commerce in Korea (ICCK) organized "India Evening" on 14<sup>th</sup> March, 2023 to share insights with Korean business community on India's plastic industry and to invite them to attend PLEXCONNECT-2023, which was held in Mumbai in June 2023.

During the meeting, Korean industry representatives were briefed about growth story of Indian Plastic Industry, recent trends in Plastic exports from India and potential of Indian Plastic product exports to South Korea. PLEXCONNECT 2023 was announced during the meeting and Korean buyers were invited to participate in PLEXCONNECT 2023. India's prominent plastic exporters took this opportunity to establish a network with Korean companies during this event.





The Welcome Address of the program was given by Shri. Swapnil Devidas Thorat, Second Secretary (Commerce & Investment), Embassy of India Seoul, Republic of Korea. Mr. Anil Sinha, Chairman, Indian Chamber of Commerce in Korea (ICCK) during his address informed participants about boosting bilateral trade between India and South Korea. Indian companies participating at KOPLAS 2023 were also introduced to participants during the program. Mr. Sribash Dasmohapatra, Executive Director, PLEXCONCIL gave presentation on PLEXCONNECT 2023. Mr Dasmohapatra highlighted goal, objective and salient features of the first ever export focused exhibition for plastics. Participants were also briefed about benefits available to Korean buyer for participation in PLEXCONNECT 2023.

## 2.9 Indian Pavilion at the COSMOPROF WORLDWIDE BOLOGNA 2023 – 17.03.2023 to 20.03.2023

PLEXCONCIL for the first time organized the India Pavilion at the prestigious COSMOPROF WORLDWIDE BOLOGNA show in Italy from 17-20, March 2023 to promote the Human Hair and Hair Products which is under the preview of PLEXCONCIL.

The 54th edition of Cosmoprof Worldwide Bologna 2023 ended with great results as the world beauty community came together. Over 250,000 professionals from more than 150 countries visited the event, meeting more than 2,900 exhibitors from 64 countries and exploring the trends & technologies of 29 country pavilions.

### 3.3 B2B(Virtual) Meeting held with an Importer of Colombia – 02.06.2022

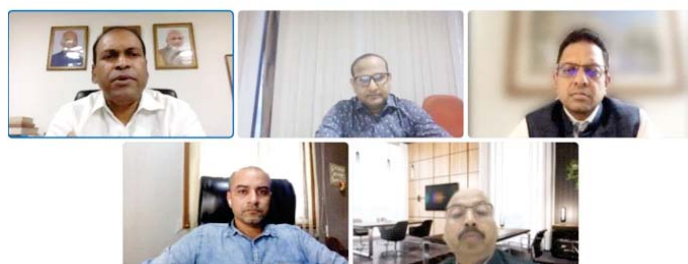

#### 4.9 Webinar on Importance of Insurance and Risk Management for Plastic Industry – 23.11.2022

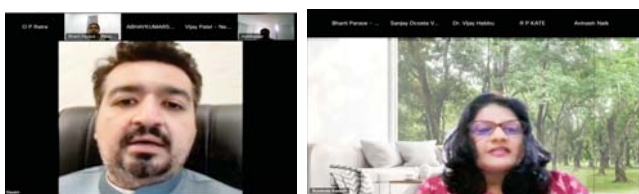

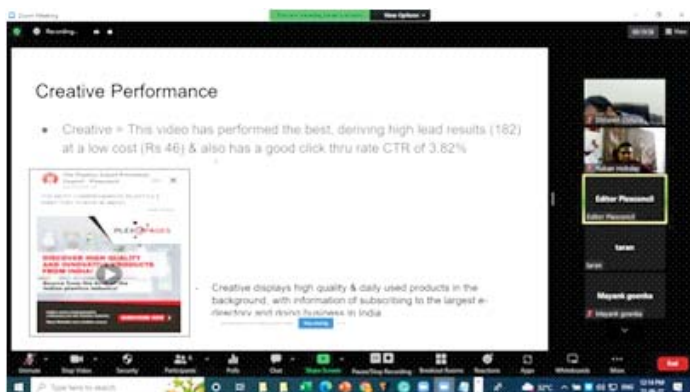

The meeting was attended by more than 70 large, medium, and small companies. Mr. Sribash Dasmohapatra, Executive Director welcomed all participants from different parts of West Bengal to the exporters meeting and congratulated the RO- East for organizing a meeting that unites the human hair industries within India.

Mr. Cherian, Panel Chairman, PLEXCONCIL, and President, Human Hair & Human Hair Products Association thanked the participants for joining the exporter meet which was organized for the first time in the history of PLEXCONCIL at Kolkata. He briefly explained the efforts taken by the Council and the Association in bringing the "Choti & Goli" under prohibited items. He said this helped the country to fetch more foreign exchange as the exporters were able to invoice the correct rate for the product curbing the practice of "under invoicing". He said this effort saw a 100% jump in exports value-wise in 2020-21.



However, he said that though many of them are glad for bringing "Choti & Goli" into the prohibited list, many are getting their license from DGFT to export the same which has diluted the entire effort of protecting the "raw" from not being exported with value addition. He emphatically encouraged all the participants to find buyers to export value-added products rather than exporting raw hair. He said that the whole world is looking at Indian Human Hair for their beauty products which is a matter of pride for the human hair industry in India. But because of a few companies who are into illegal business, the precious raw material is being misused bringing disgrace to the country and the industry.

He informed them about the CosmoProf Worldwide Exhibition in Bologna, Italy, and encouraged them to approach the Council to participate or visit to know the latest in the industry. He also briefed about the Council's efforts in getting approval from the Ministry for organizing a Capacity Training Program on Human Hair before March 2023. He said that the Council was in contact with leading "trainers" and "designers" from Italy to organize the training program for the workers and others to learn about value-added products which are going to be the future. 3(Three) Members Exporters (Mr Manoj Samanta, Mr Alamgir SK, Mr SK Mukul Ali) from Eastern India also spoke during the meeting. The meeting ended with a vote of thanks from Mr. Nilotpal Biswas, RD- East.

It was brought to the notice that there have been certain HS Codes like Masterbatches, FIBCs, Woven Sacks & Bags which have been left out and not marked under the umbrella of PLEXCONCIL. This results in the discrepancy of the export data furnished by DGCI&S which do not cover the HS Codes that fall under PLEXCONCIL leading to reduction in value of plastic exports furnished by the various Government sites. Mr. Hemant Minocha, Chairman, Mr. SribashDasmohapatra, Executive Director, Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director represented the Council at the above meeting.

#### **6.64 Meeting regarding 3rd INDO CIS working group - Vanijya Bhawan, New Delhi - 22.12.2022**

A meeting was held to discuss the 4th Working Group on promoting Trade and addressing various bottlenecks with CIS countries. PLEXCONCIL gave inputs on key issues relating to Russia which needs to be addressed for the enhancement of trade between India and the CIS region.

Mr. Hemant Minocha, Chairman, Mr. Sribash Dasmohapatra, Executive Director, Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director represented the Council at the above meeting.

#### **6.65 Trade & Policy Committee Meeting (Virtual) – 27.12.2022**

The Council organized the committee meeting under the Chairmanship of Mr. Sachin Shah from M/s. Toyop Relief Private Limited through virtual mode on 27<sup>th</sup> December 2022.

Present were panel members Mr. Rajiv Chitalia from M/s. Electrofocus Electricals Pvt Ltd., Mr. G S Anil Kumar from M/s. Jumbo Bag Ltd., Mr. Manoj Agarwal from M/s. Kanpur Plasticpack Ltd., and Mrs. Bharti Parave from PLEXCONCIL.

During the committee meeting, various issues related to exports were discussed. Overall, the committee discussed important export-related matters and initiatives to support the export community.

#### **6.66 Participation at the INDUSTRY HACKATHON at Sharda University Campus - 28.12.2022**

The Council Delhi office participated at the "INDUSTRY HACKATHON" organised by Laghu Udyog Bharti, MSME and Sharda University. The event marked a special invitee from MSME, LAGHU UDYOG BHARTI and professors from Sharda University, Ministry of Heavy Industries, India Investment Forums.

The event was a huge success and was very well attended by the key Industry players, Top Government Officials and the distinguished guests and Alumni from Sharda University. The event was an effort of the Council towards enhancing the membership growth from the northern region and the Council received a positive response from the industry to taking up membership.

One of the key aspects that was brought to focus from the industry was the lack of Clusters especially in Northern Region and big industry players urged our Council and the MSME Ministry to consider the same as Cluster Development is the need of the Hour. They emphasised on the fact that certain plastic industries are being promoted in the name of the clusters and the MSMEs and the Council have been made to believe the same although efforts should be to highlight on ground reality to truly realise the vision of Make in India

Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director and Mr. Anuj Sharma gave the presentation at the conference focusing on the membership growth and promoting PLEXCONNECT Exhibition amongst the audience.

#### **6.67 Meeting to discuss the Export Target 2022–23, Vanijya Bhawan, New Delhi – 17.01.2023**

A meeting was held by Mr. Anant Swarup, Joint Secretary, to discuss the Export Target of the Councils and the addressed the issues raised by the various councils. Mr. SribashDasmohapatra, Executive Director and Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director represented the Council at the above meeting.

#### **6.68 Raw Material Panel Meeting – 17.01.2023**

The raw material panel meeting was held on 17th January 2023 under the Chairmanship of Mr Alok Tibrewal, C/o Swastik Plastalloys Pvt. Ltd.

#### **6.69 Meeting with the local Association of Rajasthan – 19.01.2023**

A meeting was held between the PLEXCONCIL Delhi office and the local Association of Rajasthan to work out the strategy for conducting the seminars/workshops for the association. The meeting was part of the campaign towards member mobilisation of the Northern Region. The representatives of the Plastics Manufacturers Association, Rajasthan agreed for the same in the next financial year 2023 - 24. Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director and Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistant Manager represented the Council at the meeting.

#### **6.70 Meeting with the Commerce Secretary to discuss the issue of the Vostro Account - Vanijya Bhawan, New Delhi – 24.01.2023**

A meeting was held between the Council and the Commerce Secretary to discuss the issues of the VOSTRO Account especially taking into consideration of the current ongoing war between Russia and Ukraine. It was mutually agreed during the meeting that the opening of the VOSTRO Account would pave the way of the Indian Rupee as a universally accepted trading currency especially after the decline in the US Dollar and Euro.

Apart from that issues such as Indian Banks not trading with our Russia counterparts in VOSTRO account despite RBI notifications and the anomalies resulting due to VOSTRO and SPECIAL RUPEE VOSTRO ACCOUNT were also discussed. The meeting was attended by Mr. Hemant Minocha, Chairman, Mr. Sribash Dasmohapatra, Executive Director & Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistant Manager.

#### **6.71 PLEXCONCIL participation at the Bharat Parv – 26.01.2023 – 31.01.2023**

An initiative of the Government of India, "BHARAT PARV" was organized to showcase the capabilities of the Government of India in terms of various verticals which includes Trade, Defence, Tourism, IT Sector etc. Various Ministries falling under the ambit of the Government of India were allotted 50 sq. mtrs each. open space to display their role in the promotion of "MAKE IN INDIA" campaign.

PLEXCONCIL was allocated a stall by the Ministry of Commerce & Industry along with the Services Export Promotion Council for promoting the various schemes under the initiatives of the Council.

PLEXCONCIL also promoted among the North Region during the event. Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director, Mr. Subhash Srivastava, Senior Manager & Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistant Manager represented the Council at the above event.

#### **6.72 The Polymer Update Club's Buyer & Seller Meet 2023, New Delhi - 04.02.2023**

The Polymer Update Club held a Buyer Seller Meet covering the global plastics sector at Hotel Lalit. The Buyer Seller Meet was very well attended by the exhibitors and Buyer from across the globe. Key industry players like Haldia Petrochemicals, Supreme Industries, GAIL, IOCL etc. were part of this mega event. Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director, North attended the Buyer Seller Meet and represented the Council. He also highlighted the inclusion of PLEXCONCIL as a part of the Associate Members of The Polymers Update Club to enable the Council and its members to avail the benefits of such mega events in the future.

#### **6.73 Orientation programme with EPCs and other stakeholders on National Logistics Policy, Vanijya Bhawan, New Delhi - 09.02.2023**

A meeting chaired by the Commerce Secretary was held in view of the National Logistics Policy (NLP) announced by the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India and the vision of Gati Shakti scheme. There was a presentation made by the Logistics Data Bank (LDB) which defined the objective of the integration of the various online platforms of Ministries including the common interface called the Unified Logistics Interface Platform (ULIP), the various Application Interface Protocols (APIs) of the Ministries for real time tracking as well as touching upon hurdles faced by the cargo during the journey from factory to port, details of the carrier of the cargo alongwith the details of the personnel carrying the cargo, delays at the POS and the additional charges incurred by the vessel before transportation from India, etc. An important point highlighted during the meeting was the non-storage of the data of the exporters at the API of ULIP to safeguard from data breach and data mining.

The above interface has been designed and made operational to reduce the time constraints for the transportation of the cargo from factory to port. A 2 months' time period was given for the PAN India API operationalisation. Various other salient features were elaborated during the discussion which are available at the website: [https://: www.goulip.in](https://www.goulip.in).

PLEXCONCIL raised the issue of delay in clearance of goods at the Customs especially the bulky containers even though the exporter/CHA might be Authorised Economic Operator (AEO) to which the Commerce Secretary opined that the same would be looked into and after the operationalisation of the API the same would be taken care of as the online system would be integrated. Mr. Anuj Sharma also raised the issue of the poor infrastructure especially in the Northern Region and exorbitant charges at the POS and Terminal charges which was keenly noted by the



Commerce Secretary. The LDB observed the non-cooperation of the Shipping Industry in exchanging data which was taken care of by the Commerce Secretary. Various other issues from other Councils were also discussed during the meeting.

Mr. Subhash Srivastava, Senior Manager and Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistant Manager represented the Council at the above meeting.

#### **6.74 Visit to the Bawana Industrial Area, Bawana - 20.02.2023**

The Council's Delhi office official visited the Bawana Industrial Area and interacted with the President and other Association officials who were very receptive in the endeavour for the membership and exhibitor recruitment for PLEXCONNECT 2023. It was informed that there are around sixteen thousand discrete plastic units which are enormous industrial units located in and around Bawana, Tikri, Najafgarh, etc. a vast geographical area that could be converted into the Plastic parks, clusters, SEZ etc.

The Council officials highlighted the benefits of the membership of the Council as well as PLEXCONNECT 2023 and sought their help in promoting the same amongst their members. The association officials assured support to the council in promoting membership and initiatives. Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director (North) & Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistant Manager visited the Industrial Unit and met with the officials.

#### **6.75 Meeting with the Special Commissioner (Industries) - Patparganj, New Delhi - 24.02.2023**

The above meeting was chaired by the Special Commissioner (Industries) to discuss the modalities of the export competitiveness of Delhi & NCR Region. A presentation was made by Invest India towards upgradation of the manufacturers of the traders and exporters of Delhi with the objective to streamline the One District One Product (ODOP) initiative of the Government of India. The Commissioner also stressed upon the fact that the logistics policy of the Delhi Government was under the preparatory note and would soon be released shortly.

He further stressed upon the Cluster Development approach of the Delhi Government given the vast area of Bawana, Narela, Tikri, Okhla industrial area on the similar lines as that of an SEZ i.e., aiding the manufacturing capacities, providing proper infrastructure, enhancement of logistics support, availability of cheap raw materials for enhancing production etc. Invest India and Secretary Industries also mentioned that in the past they had crafted the state-of-the-art Delhi Pavilion at the Textile fair.

Mr. Anuj Sharma talked about PLEXCONNECT 2023 and requested the necessary financial support from Invest India and Delhi Industries, who sought a proposal to further explore the possibility of state of art Delhi pavilion.

Mr. Anuj Sharma had a conversation with Commissioner (Industries) regarding products like plastic sheets, films etc. which have a large domestic presence especially in North Region. As far as bottleneck are concerned, he stressed upon the Port Parity issues resulting in decline in exports especially in Northern Region and reluctance of the exporting community in environment friendly packaging, Poor Infrastructure etc.

Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistance Manager & Mr. Subhash Srivastava, Senior Manager represented the Council at the above meeting.

#### **6.76 VC to monitor export target 2022-23 for NEA Countries - 24.02.2023**

VC meeting was held on 24.11.2023 under the chairmanship of Shri Anant Swarup, Joint Secretary, Department of Commerce to discuss the Export target for the NEA countries as well as to analyse achieving of targets till January 2023. Export targets for the FY 2023-24 was also deliberated upon during the meeting.

The meeting was attended by Mr. Sribash Dasmohapatra, Executive Director and Mr. Ruban Hobday, Regional Director-South.

#### **6.77 Meeting with the DGFT to discuss the issues hampering export - Vanijya Bhawan, New Delhi - 02.03.2023**

PLEXCONCIL Executive Director, Mr. Sribash Dasmohapatra met the DGFT to discuss the issue of import of virgin plastic scrap pre-industrial. The meeting was held in view of the ban on the import of virgin plastic scrap of PVC by the Ministry of Environment, Forest & Climate Change (MOEFCC).

The DGFT assured necessary help in early resolution of the same as the ban is hampering the export of the plastic items manufactured by using the pre-industrial PVC scrap like floor coverings made of PVC etc.

Mr. Arvind Goenka, COA member & Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director - North also represented the Council at the meeting.

#### **6.78 Virtual Meeting with Human Hair & Hair Products manufacturers and Exporters Association of India on 03.03.2023**

A Virtual Meeting with Human Hair & Hair Products manufacturers and Exporters Association of India was held on 03<sup>rd</sup> March 2023 and Mr. Benjamin Cherian, President & Panel Chairman presided the meeting and briefed its members on the Proposal to Conduct Capacity Building Training & Technology Transfer Course for Human Hair and its Products. He also asked the participants at Cosmoprof Show 2023 at Italy to identify the latest trends that needs to

be adopted by the Indian hair industry for the betterment of the industry. Mr. Ruban Hobday, Regional Director-South informed the participants at the Cosmoprof Show 2023 on the guidelines to be followed for success participation at the show.

#### **6.79 Vendor Development Programme Cum Industrial Exhibition (MSME Vendor Expo with CPSEs - 2023), Madurai – 07.03.2023 & 08.03.2023**

The branch MSME Development & Facilitation Office, Madurai, organized two days “Vendor Development Programme cum Industrial Exhibition” on 7th and 8th March, 2023 at MADITSSIA, with a focus to enhance the marketing opportunities to both Manufacturing and Service Sector MSME’s.

This mega event brought the PSU’s/ CPSE’s and MSME’s under one roof and provided an opportunity to expand business linkages among PSU’s & MSME’s. The event also served as a forum to showcase the demand portfolio as well as to enhance the stores and service procurement of CPSUs and Govt Departments through MSME’s.

The event was attended by Mr. R. Dayanidhi, Assistant Director-South.

#### **6.80 Meeting with the All-India Plastics Industries Associations (AIPIA) - Pitam Pura, New Delhi - 09.03.2023**

A meeting was held with the officials of the All-India Plastics Industries Association (AIPA) in view of the exhibitor recruitment for PLEXCONNECT 2023 exhibition scheduled between June 15 - 17, 2023 at Bombay Exhibition Centre, NESCO, Mumbai. The Council made the presentation regarding the exhibition highlighting the key objectives of the exhibition and also requested the association assistance towards circulating the exhibition details amongst their members. The Association was extremely receptive about the exhibition and assured regarding circulating it amongst their members. Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director-North & Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistant Manager represented the Council at the meeting.

#### **6.81 Meeting with the Commissioner (Industries), Govt. Of NCT of Delhi - Patparganj Industrial Area - New Delhi - 10.03.2023**

A second round of the meeting was called by the Commissioner (Industries) to promote the One District One Product initiative of the Government of India. Representatives of the various zones of the Delhi NCR were also invited to the meeting to highlight their various products that command huge export potential. The Government assured the various stakeholders regarding the subsidy in the technology upgradation if and when required by them.

Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistant Manager suggested that the Plastic sheets, films, an item that has been regularly in demand and exported mostly from Delhi & NCR, be included. Mr. Anuj Sharma also suggested that the Government should take adequate steps to make Delhi a Special Economic Zone as this would regularise the power, Labour, Logistics and other operational costs to help exporters finalise export orders. He also raised the issue of Human Hair which is exported in huge volumes from Delhi but also highlighted the issue of smuggling of Human Hair which is degrading the Indian economy.

#### **6.82 Meeting with the Plastics Manufacturers Association, Rajasthan - 16.03.2023**

A meeting was held with the officials of the Plastics Manufacturers Association, Rajasthan in view of the exhibitor recruitment for PLEXCONNECT 2023 exhibition scheduled between June 15 - 17, 2023 at Bombay Exhibition Centre, NESCO, Mumbai. The Council made the presentation regarding the exhibition highlighting the key objectives of the exhibition and also requested the association assistance towards circulating the exhibition details amongst their members. The Association was extremely receptive about the exhibition and assured regarding circulating it amongst their members.

The meeting also addressed issues regarding the ban imposed on plastic items by Central Pollution Control Board. The Rajasthan members further highlighted the issue of delay in ZED certification resulting in extra burden on cost of product output that was hampering exports from Rajasthan. The other issue of Port Parity was also discussed at length. Rajasthan Association assured the full support in the PLEXCONNECT Exhibition. Mr. Ashutosh Kumar, Regional Director – North & Mr. Anuj Sharma, Assistant Manager represented the Council at the meeting.

#### **6.83 Meeting with Industries Dept. Gov. of Telangana at IESS Show, Chennai – 16.03.2023 & 17.03.2023**

A meeting was organised with Mr. T. Sudhin Paul, Deputy Director C&EP Dept., O/o: Commissioner of Industries, Govt. of Telangana, Hyderabad during the IESS 2023 show organised by EEPC at Chennai Trade Centre to discuss the proposal of Telangana Pavilion at PLEXCONNECT 2023 Show at Mumbai.

1. ## THE PLASTICS EXPORT PROMOTION COUNCIL (COMPANY LIMITED BY GUARANTEE)

### SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES TO ACCOUNTS ANNEXED TO AND FORMING PART OF THE BALANCE SHEET AS AT 31.03.2023 AND STATEMENT OF INCOME & EXPENDITURE FOR THE YEAR ENDED ON THAT DATE.

#### COMPANY INFORMATION :

The Plastics Export Promotion Council ('the Company') incorporated on 15.07.1955 is a Company Limited By Guarantee engaged in the business to support, protect, maintain, increase and promote the export of goods made wholly or partly of plastics, finished or semi-finished and plastics raw materials hereinafter referred to generally as "Plastics" and which shall extend to all territories comprised in the Union of India and also to every country in the world.

#### 1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

##### a) BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS:

The Financial Statements have been prepared and presented under the historical cost convention, on an accrual basis of accounting and in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India ("Indian GAAP") and comply in all material aspects with the Accounting Standards prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") read with the Companies (Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016 and Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 and other relevant provisions of the Act, to the extent notified and applicable. Accounting policies have been consistently applied, except where a newly notified accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in Schedule III to the Act. Based on the nature of services and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as twelve months for the purpose of current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

##### b) USE OF ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENT:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires the Management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities and the

disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the financial statements and the results of operations during the reporting period. These estimates are based on management's best knowledge of current events and actions and actual results could differ from these estimates. The differences, if any, between the actual results and estimates are recognized in the year in which the results are known/materialized. Any revision to the estimates is recognized prospectively in the current and future periods.

##### c) REVENUE RECOGNITION:

- i. The cost of Publications of the Council is charged to the Statement of Income & Expenditure in the year when expenses are incurred. The Income in respect of such publication is taken into account as and when their sales are affected. The movement of Publications is controlled under the overall supervision of the Executive Director.
- ii. Membership fees is accounted as and when renewal subscriptions are received in terms of the rules governing the membership. Membership from new members is accounted at the time when the admission of such new member/s are approved in terms of the procedure laid out for the purpose.
- iii. Other income is accounted on accrual basis except when there is significant uncertainty in determining and realizing the income.
- iv. Interest income is recognized on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the interest rate applicable.

##### d) PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT AND DEPRECIATION THEREON:

Property, Plant and Equipment are carried at cost of acquisition or construction less accumulated depreciation and/or accumulated impairment loss, if any, thereon. The cost of Property, Plant and Equipment comprises its purchase price, related taxes, duties (net of CENVAT/GST/ VAT credit), freight insurance, impairment etc. attributable to bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use; any trade discounts and rebates are deducted in arriving at the purchase price. Capital work-in-progress is stated at cost

Subsequent expenditure related to an item of Property, Plant and Equipment are added to its book value only if it increases the future benefits from the existing asset beyond its previously assessed

standard of performance. All other expenses on existing PPE, including day-to-day repair and maintenance expenditure and cost of replacing parts, are charged to the Statement of Income & Expenditure for the period during which such expenses are incurred.

Advances paid/expenditure incurred on acquisition/construction of Property, Plant and Equipment which are not ready for their intended use at each balance sheet date are disclosed under loans and advances on capital account or capital work-in progress respectively.

Gains or losses arising on de-recognition of Property, Plant and Equipment are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised in the Statement of Income & Expenditure when the asset is de-recognised. Property, Plant and Equipment retired from active use and held for disposal are stated at the lower of their net book value and net realizable value and are disclosed separately under 'Other current assets'. Any expected loss is recognized immediately in the Statement of Income & Expenditure.

#### **DEPRECIATION AND AMORTISATION :**

Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment is provided using Written Down Value Method and is charged to the Statement of Income & Expenditure as per the requirement of Schedule II of the Act.

In respect of additions to fixed assets during the year, depreciation is considered on pro-rata basis from the date such assets are put to use. Individual assets costing Rs.5,000 or less each are depreciated fully in the year of purchase.

Residual Value of all the assets has been considered as 5% of Original Cost.

#### **e) INTANGIBLE ASSETS AND AMORTIZATION:**

Intangible assets, which comprise software are stated at cost of acquisition, including any cost attributable for bringing the same to its working condition, less amortization over estimated useful life. Software is amortized on straight line basis over a period not exceeding 5 years.

The estimated useful life and amortisation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate being accounted for on a prospective basis.

#### **f) IMPAIRMENT OF ASSETS:**

The Company assesses at each Balance Sheet date

whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset. The recoverable amount is the greater of the net selling price and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value based on an appropriate discount factor. If such recoverable amount of the asset or the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. The reduction is treated as an impairment loss and is recognized in the Statement of Income & Expenditure. If at the Balance Sheet date, there is an indication that a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, the recoverable amount is reassessed and the asset is reflected at the recoverable amount subject to a maximum of depreciated historical cost. Value in use is the present value of estimated future cash flows expected to arise from the continued use of the assets and from its disposal at the end of its useful life.

#### **g) GOVERNMENT GRANT:**

i. Grants received from Government in respect of coded activities are credited to Statement of Income & Expenditure on the bases of fair estimate for the same as provided by the management, on the bases of the applicable criteria prescribed by the Government for the same.

ii. Grants received for acquiring the specific fixed assets, are reduced from the cost of such assets and or at a nominal value as the case may be.

iii. Grants for the specific Studies/Project/Events as approved by the Government, till the time such activities or objectives are achieved, are carried forward as liability. The amount spent on the projects as per the guidelines includes appropriate allocation of the administrative cost incurred by the Council on the project if so mandated under guidelines prescribed for the purpose. However, any surplus not applied for the purpose is to be refunded to the Government of India along with interest.

#### **h) RETIREMENT BENEFITS:**

i. Council's Contribution to Employees' Provident Fund maintained under the Employees' Provident Fund Scheme run by the Government is charged to Statement of Income & Expenditure.

ii. The Employees' Gratuity Liability is funded with the Life Insurance Corporation of India under Group Gratuity scheme.



Leave Encashment Benefits as applicable to permanent employees are provided for on accrual basis as at the year-end as per the Council's rules. However, the said liability is not backed by specific investment for the purpose.

**i) TRANSACTIONS IN FOREIGN CURRENCY:**

Transactions in Foreign Currency are recorded at the exchange rate prevailing at the end of the month in which the transaction took place. Net exchange gain or loss resulting in respect of foreign exchange transactions settled during the period is recognized in the Statement of Income & Expenditure for the period.

Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currency, which are outstanding as at the year-end, are translated at the year-end at the closing exchange rate and the resultant exchange differences are recognized in the Statement of Income & Expenditure. Non-monetary foreign currency items are carried forward at cost.

**j) PROVISION FOR TAXATION :**

The company is licensed to pursue charitable objects and is registered under Section 8 of the Act (erstwhile Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956) and registered under Section 12AA of Income Tax Act, 1961 and as such income is not taxable in view of exemption under Section 11 and 12 of Income Tax Act, 1961.

**k) INVESTMENT :**

Investments are classified into current and non-current investments. Investments that are readily realizable and intended to be held for not more than a year from the date of acquisition are classified as current investments. All other investments are classified as long-term investments. However, that part of non-current investments which are expected to be realised within twelve months from Balance Sheet date are also presented under "Current investments" as "Current portion of non-current investments" in consonance with the current/non-current classification scheme of Schedule III to the Act.

Non-current investments are carried at the lower of cost and fair value. The cost and fair value is compared separately in respect of each category of investments. Any reduction in the carrying amount and any reversals of such reductions are charged to the Statement of Income & Expenditure.

Non-current investments (including current portion thereof) are carried at cost. A provision for

diminution in the value of non-current investments is made only if such a decline is other than temporary in the opinion of the management. On disposal of an investment, the difference between its carrying amount and net disposal proceeds is recognized in the Statement of Income & Expenditure.

**l) CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS :**

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash and balances with banks and corporations. The Company considers all highly liquid investments with a residual maturity as at the date of purchase of three months or less and that are readily convertible to predetermined amounts of cash to be cash equivalents.

**m) CASH FLOW STATEMENTS :**

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit before tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past or future operating cash receipts or payments and item of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated.

**n) PROVISIONS, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES & CONTINGENT ASSETS :**

The Company creates a provision where there is present obligation as a result of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made about the amount of the obligation. A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is a possible or a present obligation that may, but probably will not require an outflow of resources. When there is a possible obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made. Contingent assets are not recognized in the financial statements.

**o) OPERATING CYCLE :**

Based on the nature of activities of the Company and the normal time between provision of services and their realisation in cash or cash equivalents, the Company has determined its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of classification of its assets and liabilities as current and non-current.

**p) GOODS AND SERVICE TAX (GST) INPUT CREDIT :**

GST input credit is accounted for in the books in the period in which the underlying service / goods received is accounted and when there is reasonable certainty in availing / utilising the credits.

## NOTES TO ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31.03.2023

### 20. Contingent Liability:

**Income Tax:** Rs.2.97 lakhs (P.Y. Rs.3.00 Lakhs).

**Profession Tax:** The Company has no accrued liability pertaining to Professional Tax Enrollment Certificate (PTEC) till date in case of Mumbai, Kolkata and Chennai under Profession Tax Act due to which a future contingent liability may arise.

### 21. Capital and Other Commitments (net of Advances):

Capital and Other Commitments as at 31.03.2023: NIL (P.Y. NIL).

**22.** The expenses in respect of Code-activities are subject to sanction/confirmation of the Government of India and Grant-in-aid received from the Ministry of Commerce is subject to Government Audit, non/partial fulfilment of certain conditions for eligibility of such Grant-in-aid, clarifications by the Council and final decision of the Ministry of Commerce.

**23.** During the year, based on approval received from the Ministry of Commerce & Industry, Department of Commerce E&MDA Division vide letter dated 29.09.2022 the Company has accrued Grant Income amounting to Rs.40.86 lakhs pertaining to two events

conducted in FY 22-23. The Sanction Letters for the aforementioned grants have been received at a later date in the month of August'2023. Since, the Company has reasonable assurance that the grant income is receivable by the Company in next financial year the same is recorded in compliance with "AS 12 Accounting for Government Grants".

**24.** Under the Market Access Initiative (MAI) Scheme 2021 and Micro Small & Medium Enterprise (MSME) Scheme of GOI the participation in eligible events is determined based on the specific guidelines mentioned in the Scheme. Accordingly, during the year an amount of Rs.576.72 lakhs (P.Y. Rs. 89.32 lakhs) was sanctioned by the Government.
